The new medicine is effective.			
Watering dry plants is effective for preventing death.			
<b>recognize</b>	verb	rec·og·nize	to know and remember (someone or something) because of previous knowledge or experience
I recognized the teacher as soon as he came in the room.			
I recognized her by her red hair.			
<b>align</b>	verb	a·lign	place in a line or arrange so as to be parallel or straight
I used to align the car with the curb.			
He aligned the sheets of paper on the table.			
<b>propel</b>	Verb		to push or drive (someone or something) forward or in a particular direction
My car is propelled by gasoline.			
The chair was propelled across the room when John ran into it.			
<b>he's a mess</b>	idiom		He is confused and not in control
He is a mess since he lost his job.			
He's a mess since his girlfriend broke up with him.			
<b>specify</b>	verb		to name or mention (someone or something) exactly and clearly : to be specific about (something)
Abou specifies the amount needed for school.			
You should specify your needs before going shopping.			
<b>spatial</b>	adjective	'speɪʃ(ə)l	relating to space, position, size, shape etc of things
He has such a good spatial capability that he rarely gets lost.			
Men often have good spatial intelligence.			
<b>interpersonal</b>	adj		relating to or involving relations between people :existing or happening between people
Many businessmen have good interpersonal skills.			
Interpersonal communication is hard to master.			
<b>world of good</b>	Idiom		A great benefit. This expression uses world in the sense of "a great deal,"
A vacation will do you a world of good			
Studying ESL does a world of good for newcomers			
<b>I am with you</b>	co location		I agree with you. I support you
I am with you if you want to change the title of this article for the presentation.			
I have been always with you in any situation whether it has been good or bad

<b>convey meaning</b>	Co location		to transfer the meaning of something accurately and clearly
The professor skillfully conveyed the meaning of each word in the lecture to the students at the university, so that there will not be any confusion.

<b>zero in on</b>	phrasal verb		to fix all your attention on the person or thing mentioned
I have recently zeroed in on my research topic			
I am zeroed in on the IELTS test.			
<b>logical</b>	adjective		-seeming natural, reasonable or sensible
One plus one equals two is quite logical.			
You must use logical methods when organizing research.			
<b>resolve</b>	Verb		to find an answer or solution to (something) : to settle or solve (something)
I have resolved that I shall live to the full.			
People should realize they cannot resolve all of the world's problems.			
<b>notion</b>	noun		an idea or opinion
The Canadian political system is based on the notions of equality and liberty.			
I have a notion that this new system will work.			
<b>pull together</b>	idiom		. to work as a group, esp. in order to achieve a result
We pulled together many ideas for our PowerPoint.			
If we all pull together, we can get the job done.			
<b>discriminate</b>	verb	dis- 'kri-mə- ,nāt	1. unfairly treat a person or group of people differently from other people or groups 2. to notice and understand that one thing is different from another thing : to recognize a difference between things
The human eye can discriminate between very slight gradations of color.			
Sometimes newcomers are discriminated against.			
<b>team chemistry</b>	idiom		22
If we want success as a team, we should have team chemistry.			
Team chemistry is an important item for teamwork.			
<b>unify</b>	verb	'yü-nə- ,fī	to cause (people or things) to be joined or brought together
The creation of the national railroad system unified the country.			
Two very different people are unified by a common belief			
<b>infer</b>	verb		to form (an opinion) from evidence : to reach (a conclusion) based on known facts
If someone is absent for two days, we infer that he may be sick.			
I inferred from reading my last book that success depends on practice and working very hard.

<b>challenge</b>	Verb		to say or show that (something) may not be true, correct, or legal : <u>DISPUTE</u>
A number of doctors are challenging the study's claims.			
The new lawsuit challenges the lower court's decision.			
<b>enhance</b>	verb		to increase or improve (something)
Spices can enhance food.			
My knowledge was enhanced by the new idea.			
<b>"jump in"</b>	Phrasal verb		to become involved in a situation very quickly
Onlookers jumped in to break up the fight.			
While I was discussing my project, a friend jumped in and shared a great idea.			
My friends were debating and I jumped in with a new thought.			
<b>"stay on top of"</b>	idiom		To keep control of
We stay on top of our business by focusing on our vision and mission.			
You should stay on top of positive values in life.			
<b>top of mind</b>	idiom		of greatest concern or priority
Even though my family, studies and work are important, my family is top of mind.			
A BMW is top of mind when I think of a car.
